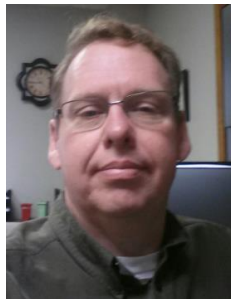

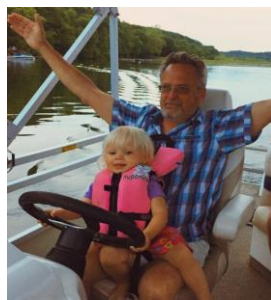

Kit Brewer

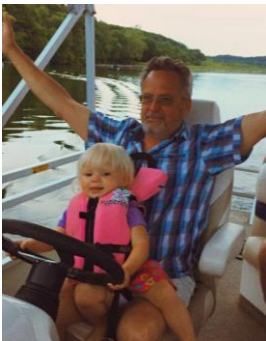

Kit writes and oversees a variety of grants including 9 solid waste district or DNR grants in the past 5 years.

Kit is currently the District V Director and sits on the Missouri Association of Sheltered Workshops Board and is involved with the legislative committees for both MORA and MASWM.

More than 40 sheltered workshops have at least some exposure to the recycling industry and provide for a high percentage of rural collections and processing in Missouri.
